





## BJA Provides \$7.6 Million For Body-Worn Cameras to Small, Rural and Tribal Law Enforcement Agencies

LOS ANGELES, CA — Justice & Security Strategies (JSS) announced today that its joint program with the Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) will award \$7.6 million to 258 small, rural, and tribal law enforcement agencies for body-worn cameras. The grantees include 198 small towns, 49 rural Sheriff and county police agencies, three tribes, and eight other agencies.

Acting Director Kristen Mahoney of BJA, said that "This grant program made it easier for small, rural, and Tribal law enforcement agencies to apply for funding. We received almost 1,000 applications, a clear indication that these agencies wanted a streamlined grant process. This serves as an example for us going forward."

JSS representative, Dr. Shellie Solomon, said that "This represents a down-payment by the Justice Department to provide law enforcement with valuable resources to increase accountability and build trust with the communities they serve. The awardees will purchase 5,605 cameras that will enhance protection for both officers and citizens."
